Acceptable recycling!

- **NEW!** Paper and plastic to-go cups & lids (emptied)
- **NEW!** Pizza boxes (with minimal grease residue), clean cardboard (flatten & cut into 2'x2' pieces or smaller), cereal boxes
- **Paper products:** newspaper, books, junk mail, magazines, windowed envelopes, paper bags, etc
- **Glass food & beverage containers:** brown, clear, or green - empty
- **Plastics by shape:** bottles, jars, jugs, and tubs
- Aluminum foil, cans, & tin cans - empty

Acceptable yard waste

- Lawn Trimmings
- Weeds
- Leaves
- Pine needles
- Pinecones

Nonacceptable yard waste

- Branches
- Tumbleweeds
- Pet Waste
- Bags (including paper yard bags)
- Sod (Compost Facility)
- Mulch (City Landfill)
- Rocks (City Landfill)

Reduce, reuse, recycle!

Recycling isn't just about turning materials into new things. As we come upon Earth Day in April lets go over the 3 R's!

Reducing is one of the highest priorities if we reduce the amount of waste we have this will reduce the amount of pollution and energy used for making new items. Some tips for reducing waste consist of buying items in bulk or less packaging and only buying what you need while avoiding single use items.

Reusing items is a great way to reduce the amount of waste. Items such as refillable water bottles and coffee mugs, cloth grocery bags, using glass storage containers for leftovers, and reuseable tableware.

Try reusing store grocery bags as lunch bags, trash can liners, covering paint trays or rollers, picking up pet waste, storing wet clothing, packing fragile items, and crafting.

Repurposing items by donating clothes, books, and furniture, using old t-shirts, sheets, or towels for rags. Buying secondhand items or renting items that aren't used as often.

Recycling is turning plastics, glass, paper, and metals into new products. Keeping the items listed above in our acceptable recycling items in mind when buying items and placing them loosely, emptied, and unbagged in your recycle container can help put them back on the shelf for their next use!

April 6th begins the Yard Waste Program

The Sanitation Division provides a yard waste program for pickup of lawn trimmings, weeds, and leaves.

Residents may enroll in this program for an additional fee That is billed from April until the program ends in November. A branch pickup is offered the 3rd Thursday of each month during the program those enrolled receive 1 cubic yd. of branches picked up for free. Residents not enrolled in the program may still schedule a branch pickup for a fee.

The City Compost Facility is open year-round Tues.– Sat. 9am to 5pm.

Starting May 3, 2026 – Sept. 27, 2026, they will be open Sundays 10am to 2pm (no loading or sales)

Accepted at the facility are limbs and brush, tree trunks less than 6'in length and less than 10" in diameter, grass clippings, pruning's, weeds, leaves, and manure.

A friendly reminder from our Compost manager.

“Our green collection and recycling stream is designed to accept only lawn trimmings, weeds, leaves, pine needles, and pinecones. Introducing branches, tumbleweeds, dirt, rocks, and trash reduces composting efficiency, slows decomposition, damages processing equipment, increases costs, and compromises final compost quality. Some of these materials also interfere with proper pathogen and weed seed destruction, reducing compliance with quality standards and useability of the finished product. To be an effective compost ingredient, branches must be processed separately into mulch. Keeping the yard waste stream clean ensures safe operations, high-quality compost, industry compliance, and supports the City's diversion goal.”
